- Beth Dalby Welcoming Community
- Update on the Mental Health Project we are doing auspicing a mental health project here. It has (3) components
- Working with High School Students across Dalby, Chinchilla and Tara run sessions in all of those using a group called "Choicez" from Sydney, talking about connections to the year 10, 11 and 12's at those schools.
- Chinchilla State High School Tony Hoang from Sydney spoke. He was a millionaire drug dealer at 13. Had a wonderful message to share.
- 600 students from Dalby State High School attended workshops they chose to meet local providers as their project. The students met and participated in (2) sessions with psychologists locally. They looked at coping with mental health through physical activities, yoga, hip hop dancing etc.
- Similar thing held out at Tara, we had 'Red Frog' do the keynote address for them, in terms of being able to understand yourself a whole lot better.
- We had a range of speakers and it has been very successful. The feedback has been amazing; I hope that we have sufficient great feedback to be considered again for that mental health project in this area, because it is needed.

- Blue Tree Art Project need to register. Goal is to have (100) blue trees on R U OK day 3pm
 7pm on the 14th September, held at Anderson Park.
- We will open our blue tree exhibition that day.
- We have some stall holders, and a sausage sizzle. Would be great if anyone wanted to do a stall for R U OK day.
- Always looked at having 1000 voices singing the one song on R U OK day– that is in the process of being planned. Information to follow.
- Dalby Circles of Care
- Group of service clubs, service providers, community groups, interested individuals that we sit under the umbrella and auspice of MYCNC. We are not a group that is incorporated.
- Number of things Dalby Circles of Care does.
- We put out information in a simple flyer for people who are in need of help and that flyer is given out and readily available in our community.
- Lions club established 'Orange Sky' laundry services out of Dalby Laundromat.
- Meals offered every Thursday night sitting at about 130 people each week.
- Goal is to have 52 groups, provide a meal just once a year.
- Fortunate that in Dalby that we have sporting clubs, businesses, schools, churches, community groups that are actually providing that meal for us.
- We have been donated a caravan that we are currently having converted to provide some accommodation for one or two people at Pioneer Park.
- Big issues at the moment are showers, difficult for people to access showers.
- Wanting to try to persuade Council, that it is a service that should be offered in our community. I would like to convert an existing toilet block into a shower block.
- May need some support at a later date.
- Dalby Delicious and Delightful
- Friday 25th August, 2023 is the Glow in the Dark Colour Run and movie night, "Puss in Boots".
- Saturday 26th August, 2023 gates open at 10am with an array of entertainment and Multi-Cultural dancing, Tribute Show and Lantern Parade.

- *Simi* is the Social Worker for Youth in Search, based at Dalby State High School, but supporting the wider Dalby community. Monday, Tuesday and Thursday.
- Youth in Search is an organisation for young people aged between 12-25 years old dealing with anxiety, depression, low self-esteem, bullying, anything that is affecting young ones. Need to be referred through.
- Running a total of four programs: -
- First is case management provides individual one on one session.
- Second is an afternoon support group meeting held every Thursday at the MYCNC commencing at 3.15 pm 4.15 pm. Provides ongoing support, checking in and planned activities.
- Third are weekend camps, starting on a Friday afternoon and ending on a Sunday afternoon. Camps are held every 4 - 6 weeks. Camps provide a safe environment for young people where we discuss different topics and concerns such as self-esteem issues, relationships, grief and communication. Support is offered via social workers and teams attending from different areas. Attendees for camps will need to be vaccinated.
- Fourth is free leadership training. If the young person attends more than two camps and are free from drugs and Covid, they can apply for leadership training.

- *Karl and Steph* help co-ordinate the Dalby Hope Centre.
- Counselling service run as an initiative of the Dalby Presbyterian Church.
- Karl is a qualified counsellor, with a history of chaplaincy.
- Provides lower-cost counselling for individuals, marriage counselling and in the long-term are looking at introducing life courses (marriage, grief or loss) for larger groups with a trained professional.
- Options for concession and subsidies available for those experiencing financial hardship. One of the cheapest counselling services available.
- (4) Counsellors available on our team.
- Operate out of the Austbroker's building on Patrick Street, (next to Coles).
- Dalby's Eva's Place Pregnancy & Early Parenting Crisis Support.
- From the woman's first stages of her pregnancy and throughout the first year of the child's life, woman who may have had a miscarriage, stillbirth or any reproductive issues.
- Provide free mentoring, information, any services needed and counselling (weekly or fortnightly).
- Eva's Place Dollars are able to be used to purchase baby clothes, change tables, etc. any needs for the baby, when they come for a counselling and mentoring session.
- Referrals can be made by your Services with the consent of the person. We would welcome either warm handovers or you can remain involved in the support of your client through their interaction with our Service.
- Our office hub is at 47 Bellevue Street, Toowoomba but our outreach is extensive, and my area includes Dalby, Chinchilla, Miles, Wandoan and Taroom.

- It's their opportunity to make an application to the scheme to tell their story to have their experience acknowledged and get an offer of redress from the government that can provide potential (3) different outcome for people
 - 1. Free physiological care (Counselling)

 2. Apply for a direct personal response (opportunity to have a direct interaction with the institution responsible, could receive an apology from them or to have an interaction that is laid by the applicant around what would be healing to them

• 3. Is for people to receive the monetary payment to support any lifelong impacts Are some eligibly criteria for people applying to the scheme. Flyers attached.

What is the National Redress Scheme?

The National Redress Scheme ('the Scheme') was developed in response to the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse. The Commission estimated over 60,000 people have experienced institutional abuse in Australia.

The Scheme is an important step in gaining recognition, acknowledgement and support for people who have experienced institutional child sexual abuse, and in holding institutions accountable.

The Scheme can provide:

- Access to counselling
- A monetary payment
- A direct personal response such as an apology from the institution or institutions responsible.

It is your choice whether you want to receive all or some of these components.

The Scheme began on 1 July 2018 and people can apply until 30 June 2027.

TASC National offers **free**, **confidential support** for people seeking to learn more or engage with the Scheme.

Who is TASC's Redress Support Service for?

TASC's Redress Support Service is for anybody in Toowoomba and south west Queensland who has experienced institutional child sexual abuse.

Some eligibility requirements apply, however if we are unable to help you, we will endeavour to link you with a service who can.

Our Case Workers will be dedicated solely to helping people engage with the Scheme.

Our heartfelt aim is to provide a compassionate and trauma informed support service for people impacted by child sexual abuse.





What will TASC's Redress Support Service do for me?

Reaching out for support can be daunting, so we'd like to let you know what to expect when you contact TASC.

Your Case Worker will start assisting you through the application process and keep you up to date on any developments as they happen.

TASC Case Workers provide person-centred practical and emotional support throughout the process and can assist with advocacy and referrals to other appropriate supports.

Redress applicants have until **30 June 2027** to lodge their applications.



How can TASC help you?

Your first contact could be by **phone**, **in person**, **email or online form.** On contacting TASC you will be introduced to our intake team who will walk you through the eligibility criteria and take your personal details in line with Privacy Legislation Principles.

At each step your TASC Case Worker will be there to provide support, information and advice based on your circumstances.

You are able to make an informed choice to progress or pause your redress application at any stage over the duration of the Scheme.

This is a confidential service so we will not share your personal information outside of TASC and the Scheme.
